COUNCIL CHECKLIST: WHERE DO YOU STAND?

Should Already Be Done

- Confirmed transportation and tour arrangements. Jamboree Score
- Finalized council fee and payment schedule.
- Designed council shoulder insignia.
- Developed promotion for summer camps.
- Contacted your regional jamboree coordinator in writing regarding hosting international Scouts.

In Progress

- Promote jamboree at council events.
- Promote jamboree at roundtables.
- Promote jamboree at troop meetings.
- Make individual calls to Scouts who indicate an interest in attending.
- Hold monthly committee meetings.

Next 45 Days

- Order council shoulder insignia.
- Order custom unit numeral.
- Order equipment packages.
- Second national fee is due August 1.

COUNCILS, PLEASE NOTE:

Advise your front counter personnel NOT to accept fee payments from persons serving as jamboree staff members. Staff members should use a staff transmittal form, No. NSJ-106-01, and send their fee payments directly to the national office.

CUSTOM UNIT NUMERALS AVAILABLE

Have your council's troop numerals custom-embroidered on a special 2001 National Scout Jamboree patch.

Custom unit numerals must be ordered in packages of 48. The deadline for ordering is April 1, 2001.

DESIGN YOUR OWN JAMBOREE CSP

Supply Division's Custom Design Department can help your council produce a one-of-a-kind embroidered council shoulder patch for the big event.

Your design must include one of the following: "Boy Scouts of America," "BSA," or the BSA universal emblem or fleur-de-lis. You may include all or part of the official jamboree emblem. Designs are subject to national office approval.

Patches must be ordered in increments of 40. See the enclosed order form, No. 70-063, or call 1-800-323-0732 for more information.

EQUIPMENT AND TENTAGE PACKAGE PLANS

The 2001 National Scout Jamboree Package Plans order form, No. 70-068, is available to help jamboree planning committees determine tentage and unit equipment needs for their local council contingents.

Place your order as soon as possible to make sure you receive your shipment prior to your prejamboree training encampment. Order by October 31, 2000, and receive free freight on tent packages.

SECOND PAYMENT

The second payment for the jamboree is due August 1, 2000. The Jamboree Division will be mailing transmittal forms, No. NSJ- 107-01, to each council before the end of June. The second payment is \$220 per adult leader and Scout.

CONSERVATION UPDATE

New information has been released since the printing of the Council Jamboree Guidebook.

Cotton. Cotton bolls (pods), cotton with seeds, cottonseed, and cotton plants must be certified by state or federal agriculture department officials before leaving the following states: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, or Texas.

Live Plants. All live plants and materials must be certified by the agriculture officials of the state of origin as pest-free. Contact the department of agriculture in your home state, especially if you are coming from California, before planning to bring any live plants.

Fire Ants. Special attention must be given to plants, soils, objects, pots, or materials from any states that have fire ants. Careful inspection and other measures must be taken to prevent the spread of these ants from the entire states of Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, and Texas, from Puerto Rico, or from infested portions of Arkansas, North Carolina, Oklahoma, and Tennessee.

Brown Garden Snail. Brown garden snails are prohibited in Virginia under the Nursery and Plant Pest Laws. Any plants or soil from Arizona, California, Oregon, Utah, Washington, or any other state with a known infestation of this pest snail must be inspected and certified prior to shipment to Virginia.

Poles and Logs. All poles and logs must have the bark removed. Poles and logs from the states listed below must be inspected and found free of pine shoot beetles before moving these items to the jamboree.

A federal quarantine has been enacted for the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperdo*. Any regulated articles from regulated areas must be inspected and certified prior to movement.

Regulated articles include:

- (1) cut Christmas trees of pine, *Pinus* spp.,
- (2) logs and lumber with bark attached and tree stumps of pine;
- (3) nursery stock of pine; and
- (4) bark nuggets, including bark chips of pine.

The following states currently contain counties regulated for the pine shoot beetle: Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

DON'T MOVE GYPSY MOTH

In some areas of the country, the gypsy moth is a significant threat to live trees. Fort A. P. Hill is in the area of gypsy moth infestation, so there is no problem in bringing poles or logs to the site. However, there is a concern that gypsy moths might be transported to unaffected areas. The Virginia Department of Plant and Pest Services is providing a pamphlet on how to conduct a self-inspection of poles and logs for gypsy moths. This pamphlet must be distributed to your jamboree leaders.

The self-inspection for gypsy moths should be done just prior to poles and/or logs being transported from the jamboree site to the home area. Gypsy moths and caterpillars can simply be squashed. Gypsy moth egg masses need to be scraped off. A "Don't Move Gypsy Moth" pamphlet is enclosed in this bulletin.
